Further contributions by Martin Paul Eve (2022) emphasize the integration of digital tools into literary studies, arguing that Digital Humanities fosters interdisciplinary collaboration and introduces new research methodologies that complement traditional literary criticism. Recent studies, such as those by Anirban Sen (2025) and Muhammad Ibrahim Khokhar and Muhammad Ejaz Khan (2024), indicate that Digital Humanities has significantly transformed literary criticism by integrating data-driven methods and interdisciplinary approaches. Their works highlight how computational techniques, such as text mining and corpus analysis, enable scholars to uncover patterns and trends across large bodies of texts.
